









Key Concepts:

 The main concepts of TOK include the sources from which we gain our knowledge, concepts deliberated by Aristotle and Kant, and memory. Try to focus on questions such as "How do we know what we know?" and "How does memory and sense perception correlate?"

The TOK Essay




The TOK essay, essentially, is the biggest percentage of your overall grade. The task is to pick a prescribed title and implements multiple knowledge questions and answer them. My advice is to pick a subject you can expand on.

For the essay, the structure goes as follows: the title, 2 or 3 areas of knowledge and 2 real-life, personal examples. I have posted an example of a TOK essay on the "Things You May Need" page.



The exhibition is a personal project that includes 3 personal items.

- You must select a knowledge question that adheres to your 3 items
- Relate it to your personal experiences
- Also relate it to a global issue/perspective



- An introduction is optional, but try to include one because it outlines your objectives
- Choose a knowledge question that relates to your area of knowledge
- An example is posted on the "Things You May Need" page
